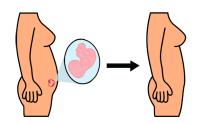

Abortion means to end a pregnancy.



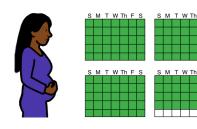
Rights are things that everyone should be able to

• do.

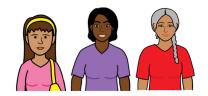
## **Abortion in the ACT**



In the ACT it is **legal** to have an abortion

• at any time of your pregnancy





at any age.

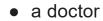


Legal means a law made by the government that everyone **must** follow.

## Who can do an abortion?



In the ACT an abortion can be done by





some nurses



some midwives.



It is **illegal** for someone to do an abortion who is **not** 

• a doctor



a nurse who is trained to do an abortion



• a midwife who is trained to do an abortion.



Illegal means something is **not** allowed by the law.



You can **not** be forced to have an abortion if you do **not** want one.



## When a doctor or nurse refuses to do an abortion

Refuse means to say no.



Refusing to do an abortion can also be called **conscientious objection**.

Conscientious objection is when someone refuses to do something against their beliefs.



For example, a doctor or nurse can refuse to do an abortion because of

their religion

or



• another personal reason.



A doctor or nurse **must** give you information about where else you can go to have an abortion.

# When a doctor or nurse cannot refuse to do an abortion



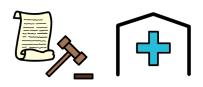
A doctor or nurse **cannot** refuse to do an abortion if

• your life is in danger



• you need medical help.

## **Your rights**



You have rights when you get healthcare.

The Australian Charter of Healthcare Rights says what rights you have when you get healthcare.

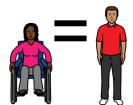


You have the right to

• feel safe



be treated with respect



be treated fairly.

## If you want to give feedback



Feedback is when you say what you think about

• a service



staff.





Feedback can make the service better.

## Types of feedback





A **compliment** is when you say what was good about a service.





You could say why you think the service was good.





A **suggestion** is when you tell someone your ideas about what could be done better.

## 3 You could make a complaint



A complaint is when

• you are **not** happy with a service or staff

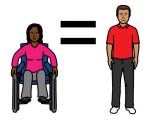
and



you say why.



Every health service **must** have a way to get your feedback.



You still have the right to be treated fairly and get the healthcare you need if you give feedback.
